Anna L. Ahlers is a research assistant and doctoral candidate in Greater China Studies at Tübingen University, Germany. Her dissertation investigates contemporary China's local governance and policy implementation at county, township and village level, by analyzing programs to "Build a New Socialist Countryside" in four empirical cases.

Genia Kostka is an Assistant Professor of Chinese Business Studies at the Frankfurt School of Finance and Management in Germany. Her current research projects examine variations in environmental practices within and between local governments in China, the role of political leaders' personal agendas and beliefs in policy formulation, China's cadre rotation system, and differences in local government capacities for climate change mitigation in China and India.
